## Chapter 3: Making a Living in the 19th Century

Chapter 3 is found on pages 46 to 67 of *Voyage to Discovery*. In this chapter students will first examine how people made a living in the 1800s and make a comparison to the present day. They also examine how Newfoundlanders and Labradorians were tied to seasonal patterns of activity. They then explore the various fisheries carried out in the province in the 1800s, the relationship between merchants and fishermen, as well as other subsistence activities such as trapping.
